Brandenburg Concertos (January 2023)

BENJAMIN ACRISH (trumpet) has been performing on trumpet for over 30 years. He attended the Crane School of Music and holds a Masters of Fine Art from the Purchase Conservatory of Music where he studied with jazz greats Ray Vega, Jim Rotondi and Jon Faddis. Since moving to Westchester in 2005 he has established himself as a top call musician, playing a diverse range of styles including, classical, jazz, and rock. He is a regular member of several award winning local ensembles, including the Westchester Symphonic Wind and the Benson-Scott Big Band. He has most recently founded a NOLA inspired brass band - The Bear Mountain Brass. Mr. Acrish is a dedicated music teacher and currently works in the Hendrick Hudson School District where he is the High School Band Director and guitar instructor. His students and music department have been the recipients of numerous awards, including NAMM's "Best Communities for Music Education" for the last 4 years. Benjamin Acrish lives in Croton-on-Hudson with his wife, Karen, and their two girls Abigail and Aliya.

KATE ASHBY (violin) is co-Artistic Director of Westchester Chamber Soloists and as a co-founder of the ensemble has played a leading role in producing our annual chamber music and orchestral programs since 2018. In October 2022, Kate joined the staff of the new David Rockefeller Creative Arts Center at The Pocantico Center. She previously served as Artistic Director and Music Program Director of RiverArts and was a co-Producer of the RiverArts Music Tour. From 2018-2020, Kate was an Associate at Primo Artists in New York, coordinating engagements for international classical soloists and conductors. Kate is a member of the Yonkers Philharmonic Orchestra and has performed widely with chamber vocal ensembles in the New York area, including Monteverdi's Vespers at Concordia and Bach's St. John Passion at Lincoln Center. Kate moved to New York from London in 1995 to pursue a career in modern dance and performed with Pilobolus in Mozart's Die Zauberflöte, directed by John Eliot Gardiner, as well as in performances with Robert Battle, Parsons Dance Company, Merce Cunningham Repertory Group and others. Highlights include performances at the Amsterdam Concertgebouw, Queen Elizabeth Hall, Carnegie Hall and Lincoln Center. A native of Liverpool, England, Kate holds a BA Honors Degree from University of Kent at Canterbury.

THOMAS BASTONE (bass) is a musician and music educator originally from White Plains, NY. He is currently the orchestra director at Harrison High School. Prior to his appointment in Harrison, he taught instrumental and general music in the Ossining and Spackenkill

UFSDs, as well as with the Philadelphia String Project. An active freelancer in the Tri-State area, he is principal bass of the Taconic Opera Orchestra and the Yonkers Philharmonic Orchestra, and has also performed with the Woodstock and the Northern Dutchess Symphonies. He has also been heard playing in the pit orchestras for various musicals at the White Plains Performing Arts Center in White Plains, and Westchester Broadway Theater in Elmsford. Mr. Bastone has been fortunate to perform overseas, with the AIMS Festival Orchestra in Graz, Austria, and the Siena (January 2023) Music Festival Symphony and Opera Orchestras in Tuscany. Additionally, Mr. Bastone is an active member of several professional organizations, including NAfME, NYSSMA, ASTA and WCSMA. He was invited to present at the ASTA National Conferences in 2012 (Atlanta, GA) and 2013 (Providence, RI) regarding his work with the Philadelphia String Project. Mr. Bastone received a Bachelor of Music in Music Education at Temple University's Boyer College of Music and Dance in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, where he studied double bass with Robert Kesselman of the Philadelphia Orchestra. He earned a Masters Degree in Music Education at the University of the Arts in Philadelphia.

CHARLIE BENNETT (cello) was born and raised in Buffalo, NY. He began cello lessons with Bruce Cramer and later studied with Roman Mekinulov. An early interest in jazz led him to also study the bass with Bill Staebell. Mr. Bennett has degrees from the Crane School of Music at SUNY Potsdam and the University of Texas at Austin. In Austin, he did extensive chamber music study with the Miró Quartet. He has taken lessons with Erik Friedlander and performed in master classes for Matthew Haimovitz and David Litrell. As a performer, Mr. Bennett has worked with a number of orchestras including the Orchestra of Northern New York and the Round Rock Symphony. He enjoys exploring the rich musical world of string playing and can be found sitting in with various folk, jazz and rock groups, performing in musicals, and playing chamber music with friends. Most recently, he founded Taproom Chamber Music, which brings live chamber music to local breweries and informal performance spaces. Currently, Mr. Bennett is a string instructor in the Harrison Central School district and teaches privately through the Hudson River School of Music. Outside of teaching and performing, he has coached high school track and cross country, and organized a summer youth track program. Mr. Bennett is an avid runner, and enjoys reading, the outdoors, and spending time with his wife, son and two pet goats.

LARISSA BLITZ (violin) was born in St. Petersburg, Russia and received her degree from the St. Petersburg's Conservatory, where she also worked at the St. Petersburg Opera House and maintained a private teaching studio. She received her Masters degree from the Manhattan School of Music, studying with Rafael Bronstein and Ariana Bronne. Since then, Ms. Blitz has had an extensive performing and teaching career playing in orchestras such as the Brooklyn Philharmonic, the Springfield, Stamford and Savannah Symphonies, the Berkshire Opera, and the Manchester Music Festival and Tchaikovsky Chamber

Orchestras, among others. She worked on Broadway and as concertmaster in a touring production of "Fiddler on the Roof". Her recent solo and chamber music performances include Beethoven's violin sonatas, trios by Rachmaninoff and Quartets by Faure, including appearances at the annual RiverArts Music Tour. Ms. Blitz teaches at a private studio in New Jersey and with the Spring Creek Youth Orchestra in Brooklyn, NY, among other venues and was previously on the faculty with RiverArts and at Franklin Pierce University.

DOROTHY DARLINGTON (oboe/English horn) was born in New York City but spent about half her upbringing in Lake Placid where she began her oboe studies. She holds three degrees in music and has performed with the Costa Rica, Savannah, Jacksonville and Atlanta Symphonies, after which she joined the US Marine Band known as "The President's Own" for 6 years for White House duties and tours to Europe under President Reagan. Finding the military commitment too intensive to consider starting a family, she free-lanced with Wolf Trap, the National Symphony (at Kennedy Center) and the Washington Bach Consort among others, as well as a serving as a long-term alternate with the New York Philharmonic. Dorothy has been a member of the Ridgefield Symphony for 35 years and recently performed for an entire weekend in Carnegie Hall. She has two sons, age 29 and 25, and she thinks they are the best thing that ever happened to her!

RUTH DIAMOND FABES (oboe) earned a B.M. in Music Education SUNY Fredonia and an M.M.E. at the Hartt School of Music. She retired from the New York City Dept. of Education after 30 years as a Teacher of Instrumental Music and Chorus in Junior High Schools. Ruth is currently Coordinator of "Live in HD" at Monmouth University, and performs with the New Jersey Wind Symphony while also teaching senior citizens, performing with local orchestras, and volunteering, when time and distance allows. She lives in Staten Island, NY with her husband, Keith, and Ruby the Doberman. During the pandemic lockdown, Ruth learned how to sew and make quilts (discovering that it's easier than making oboe reeds!).

MONICA GERARD (viola) has performed with the Brooklyn Philharmonic, Orchestra of St. Luke's, American Composer's Orchestra, Westchester Philharmonic, American Ballet Theater, Stamford Symphony, and New Jersey Symphony. As a baroque violist, she has performed and recorded with the Hanoverian Ensemble. She has served on the faculties of the Hoff-Barthelson Music School and Hudson River School of Music and currently maintains a large private studio of viola and violin students. Her primary teachers have included Raphael Hillyer, Jesse Levine, Karen Tuttle, Kim Kashkashian, and Hatto Beyerle. Ms. Gerard holds a Bachelor of Arts in Music from Yale College, a Master of Music in Viola from the Yale School of Music and studied as a Fulbright Scholar at the University of Music and Performing Arts in Vienna, Austria.

ELLEN GRUBER (oboe) is a New York City-based oboist, currently studying Orchestral Performance with Sherry Sylar at the Manhattan School of Music. She previously attended the Peabody Institute, where she obtained degrees in oboe performance, recording arts and sciences, and acoustics. Ellen has played in a variety of ensembles, including the Baltimore Symphony Orchestra, the MSM Symphony Orchestra, and the Peabody Symphony Orchestra. She has also attended several music festivals and masterclasses, including Interharmony Music Festival, Hidden Valley Music Seminar and Eastern Music Festival. Ellen was part of Peabody's Inaugural Sensory Friendly Performance Project, where she played chamber music in a concert with the Musical Autist, an organization of musicians with autism. She has performed chamber music in other settings as well, including on Peabody's Friday Noon:30 concert series and on a Showcase concert at Interharmony in Aqui Terme, Italy. In her spare time, Ellen loves to cook and bake, as well as play with her dog, Henry.

AMY HERSH (flute) has an active career that combines her love of chamber music, orchestral performance and teaching. The New York Times has written that Ms. Hersh "...plays the flute...with directness and an ear for subtlety." She began her career playing flute and piccolo in the Mexico City Philharmonic and since then has performed with many ensembles, including the NJ Symphony, Long Island Philharmonic, New York Gilbert and Sullivan players, and with various Broadway pit orchestras. She currently plays with the St. George's Choral Society and Hudson Valley Philharmonic and is a member of chamber ensembles The Virtuosi Woodwind Quintet and the Cara Quartet. Ms. Hersh made her New York debut at Carnegie's Weill Hall as an Artist's International-winning member of the "Venus Trio", a group of flute, harp, and mezzo-soprano. She was also a winner of the NY Flute Club competition, performing in CAMI Hall. She earned Bachelors and Masters degrees from the Manhattan School of Music, and attended international programs in Nice, France and Canada, studying with Alain Marion and Robert Stallman. Her teachers have included Carol Wincenc, Harold Bennett, and Harvey Sollberger. She is an advanced level Suzuki flute teacher and teaches at the Hackley School in Tarrytown and at her home studio.

MARJORIE HONE (flute) grew up in Ohio and after graduating from Michigan State University she taught social studies in the Marietta, Ohio school district and later worked as assistant to the Director of Libraries at Columbia University. She studied flute with William Hebert, Paige Brook, Judith Mendenhall and Eleanor Lawrence and most recently with Sandra Miller. She served as principal flutist in the Westchester Symphonic Winds for over 20 years and is a long-time board member, including serving as president from 1995-2005 and now serving as treasurer. She has also played piccolo with the Chappaqua Orchestra, sings in her church choir, and was a member of the Westchester Symphony for many years. She maintains a private studio in Irvington and is active as a chamber

musician and soloist, including many performances for the Hudson Valley Music Club. She has been active in her church and in community organizations, including chairing the PTSA, Irvington Town Hall Theater, Inc., the Irvington Drug Abuse Council, and the Hudson Valley Music Club. She also is a member of the Thursday Club charitable group. Her other passions include whitewater kayaking, swimming, Pilates, and enjoying her granddaughters.

LORI HOROWITZ (violin) began her musical training at the Westchester Conservatory of Music with Gabriel Banat. As a high school senior, during a foreign exchange program to Brazil, she served as a volunteer member of the São Paolo State Symphony Orchestra. Lori continued her musical studies at Oberlin College before embarking on a medical career. While in medical school she was a founding member of, and soloist with, the Albert Einstein Symphony Orchestra. During her medical and post-medical training, she also performed with the Riverside Orchestra, the New Amsterdam Symphony, The 92nd Street Y Orchestra, and the Bronx Chamber Orchestra. Since settling back in Westchester, Lori has enjoyed a longstanding involvement with the St. Thomas Orchestra and serves as their concertmaster. She has also played with The Chappaqua Orchestra, now known as Orchestra 914. In 2013 Lori returned to school to pursue her musical studies more formally at Purchase College where she earned a Performer's Certificate and a Master's Degree in Violin Performance. She enjoys performing in chamber music concerts around the county, including with the River Arts Music Tour. When not playing her violin, Lori maintains a practice of Child & Adolescent Psychiatry.

TOM JORDAN (French horn) began playing the horn as a child, never dreaming it would lead him down such interesting paths. He studied Music at Gettysburg College, The Hartt School of Music, and Western Connecticut State University, and enjoyed 40 years of teaching music in Isabel and Mobridge, South Dakota, New Canaan, Connecticut, and Mamaroneck, New York. He has played in numerous ensembles and settings, but currently enjoys playing horn with the American Chamber Orchestra, The Westport Community Band, the Connecticut Symphonic Winds, The Vintage Brass Quintet, the Fairfield County Brass, and on guitar, in a duo with his wife on flute at St. John's Lutheran Church in Stamford, CT.

PAUL-LUCIEN KULKA (flute) is member, arranger and adapter of the "New-York Metropolitan Flute trio" and was a member of the French National Police Orchestra before moving to New York in 2019. His musical education began at the age of 6 in Saint-Raphaël, France, and he entered the Nice Conservatory at age 14 in the flute class of Jean Ornetti, where he was awarded a 1st Prize Gold Medal in 1979. The following year, Mr. Kulka won the Prize for the town of Nice. Mr. Kulka went on to study at the Regional Conservatory of Lyon under the tutelage of Marius Beuf, and he received the Lyon

Regional Conservatory's Gold Medal upon his graduation in 1982. He also studied with Alain Marion in the Nice Summer Music Academia and with Christian Lardé at the Paris Music Academia. Mr. Kulka was an educator in several music schools in the Lyon area and moved to Paris upon winning the seat in the prestigious French National Police Orchestra, with whom he toured Japan and Morocco. Playing flute and piccolo, Mr. Kulka also performed with The RATP Orchestra (Subway Orchestra of Paris), the Synaxis Orchestra in Rousse, Bulgaria, and as a soloist with a variety of other ensembles. Since relocating to New York in 2019, Mr. Kulka has been a member of the Lehman College & Community Concert Band, the Yonkers Philharmonic Orchestra, the Brooklyn Woodwind Symphony (until Dec. 2022), the New Westchester Symphony Orchestra and the Flute Choir of New York.

ROBERT LAWRENCE (violin) Bob Lawrence has had a varied performing career, ranging from Karl Munchinger's Stuttgart Chamber Orchestra to the acclaimed Broadway revival of *Guys and Dolls*, starring Nathan Lane and Faith Prince. He is currently the director of programming as well as violinist for the All Seasons Chamber Players (NJ), violinist for the Caecilian Chamber Ensemble (NYC), concertmaster of the New York Gilbert and Sullivan Players, and associate concertmaster of the Springfield (MA) Symphony Orchestra. He has also served as concertmaster for Opera Saratoga (formerly the Lake George Opera Festival), the Mid Atlantic Opera, Teatro Lirico D'Europa, and the Teatro Lirico Sperimentale. Bob has appeared at the Grand Teton, Colorado, and Spoleto Festivals. He studied at Yale University and the Accademia Chigiana in Siena, Italy, and has taught with RiverArts since 2005.

MILES LEVINE (cello) is a congressionally recognized young cellist and student at Hastings High School. He began his cello studies at age four at The School for Strings in New York City with Alex Croxton, and currently studies at Juilliard Pre-college under the tutelage of Astrid Schween. Miles gave his orchestral debut at age 13 and has played in venues such as Carnegie Hall's Stern Auditorium and Weill Hall, Merkin Hall, and the Dimenna Center for Classical Music. Now 16, he has received numerous awards and accolades, including first prize at the New York International Classical Music Competition, Yonkers Philharmonic Concerto Competition, and Medici International Music Competition, as well as the gold prize at the Camerata Artists International Competition. He has also been recognized with second prize at the International Grande Music Competition, third prize at the Bellagrande International Music Competition, a special recognition award at the New York Chamber Players Orchestra Concerto Competition, and the Christine Nelson Memorial Scholarship. Miles has attended summer programs and festivals such as Meadowmount and the Heifetz International Institute, and has played in masterclasses for esteemed musicians David Geber, Rebecca Fisher, Julia Lichten, Steven Doane, Alan Stepansky, Elizabeth Simkin, Shai Wosner, Amy Yang, and

Melissa White. He also has substantial chamber music experience, studying at New York Youth Symphony, Juilliard, Heifetz, New York String Orchestra Seminar, and more. With a wide breadth of experience, Miles has a passionate love for music.

LAURA MACBETH (violin) studied violin at Interlochen National Music Camp during high school, and with Nancy Cirillo at Wellesley College and later with Kyung Chee at the University of Washington. She has performed with many orchestras and chamber groups over the years, including the Tacoma Symphony Orchestra, the Northwest Mahler Festival Orchestra, and the Park Avenue Chamber Symphony of Manhattan. As soloist, Laura has performed J.S. Bach's A minor violin concerto and the trio version of Stravinsky's L'Histoire du Soldat with New York City's Chamber Orchestra of Science and Medicine. She works as a pediatrician at WestMed Medical Group in Rye.

ANNE-MARIE MOT (viola) was born in Brussels, Belgium and came to New-York in 1988 on a Fulbright scholarship, to study at Manhattan School of Music with Doctor Mikowsky. Graduating in 1990 with the first ever Master Degree in Two Piano Performance, she and her twin sister Monique started a performance career as a two piano ensemble, "The Mot Sisters". Together, they performed at several venues in New-York, Connecticut, Washington DC and Miami. They also played live on WNYC New-York, and appeared on the television show "entr'acte" on RTL, Brussels. Prize-winners at the Murray Drannoff International Two Piano Competition in Miami, Florida, they went on to make the world premiere recording of two of its commissioned works: Recuerdos by William Bolcom, and Two Pianos by Morton Gould. The recording is available on Amazon. The Mots sisters performed this summer with the Geneva Chamber Orchestra, at the Rencontres Musicales de Tannay, and performed the duo-piano parts with orchestra in Saint-Saëns' Carnival of the Animals. Apart from the piano duo, Anne-Marie is also an experienced viola player. As a string player, she plays with many string quartets and ensemble. She has performed in San Francisco, Lexington (Virginia), New Jersey and New York. She is currently a member of the St. Thomas orchestra in Westchester, and is delighted to participate in these two wonderful concerts with Westchester Chamber Soloists. Anne-Marie has been teaching piano in Westchester since 1990, at Hackley School, the Masters School, and has now a very successful private studio along the Rivertowns. Recently, joining her passion for music and horses, Anne Marie is also a Freestyle designer (musicalhorse.com), and edits the musical part of the dressage freestyle, for amateur riders.

ALAN MURRAY (piano/harpsichord) is the founder and Executive & Artistic Director of Westchester Chamber Soloists, which was conceived from inception as a chamber orchestra focused on the Concerto literature in which the orchestra's members would be the soloists, enabling them to demonstrate their skills as both solo performers and ensemble collaborators. He has appeared extensively in solo and chamber music recitals

and as concerto soloist with symphony orchestras in the US and Europe, performing the great piano concertos of Bartók, Beethoven, Brahms, Chopin, Dvořák, Liszt, Prokofiev, Ravel, Rachmaninoff, Saint-Saëns, Scriabin and Tchaikovsky, as well as recording in 2020 the complete cycle of Mozart's solo piano concertos. A dedicated chamber musician, Alan - together with WCS & Friends - has been a regular participant at the RiverArts' Annual Music Tour in the lower Hudson Valley, performing Beethoven's and Brahms' complete Sonatas for Violin & Piano and for Cello & Piano as well as duos, trios, quartets, quintets and sextets by Arensky, Brahms, Dohnanyi, Fauré, Grieg, Mendelssohn, Piazzolla, Poulenc, Ravel, Schumann, Tchaikovsky and others. As piano soloist, in the 2010-2012 seasons he presented the Masters Series and Sunrise Series concerts in lower Westchester County, performing the complete cycles of major works by Chopin, Schumann, Debussy, Ravel and J.S. Bach as well as Beethoven's 32 Piano Sonatas and Diabelli Variations in a series of 40 recital programs, as well as major works by Spanish masters Albéniz (*Iberia*) and Granados (Goyescas), Liszt and Rachmaninoff. When not enjoying musical pursuits, Alan maintains a career in insurance risk analytics and capital markets. He holds a degree in physics/cosmology and languages from Cornell University, where he also received a special University Award for distinguished piano recital soloist. Alan resides in Hastings with his wife Amada, daughter Celia and cavalier King Charles spaniel Lizzy.

SERGEY NAZAROV (violin) has performed in Ukraine, Israel, Italy, the United States, Brazil and Canada. He has appeared at such venues as Carnegie Hall, Weill Recital Hall, Merkin Concert Hall, Alice Tully Hall at Lincoln Center and Trinity Church. His solo and chamber music engagements include performances with Ocean City POPS, Brooklyn Neighborhood Orchestra, Lehman College, St. Thomas Orchestra, Albert Einstein College Symphony Orchestra, Lyric Mountain Festival, Connecticut Alliance for Music and others. LIZ NILSEN-BAUMWOLL (viola) has performed with the Albany Symphony, Hudson Valley Philharmonic, Manhattan Chamber Orchestra and the New York Gilbert & Sullivan Players. She is also a founding member of the Rivertown String Quartet. Liz earned her Bachelor of Fine Arts degree at SUNY Purchase (now Purchase College), and a Masters of Fine Arts at the Mannes College of Music. She also has a Masters in Teaching from Lehman College (CUNY) and Suzuki Teacher Certification from the School for Strings. SACHI PATITUCCI (cello) is a graduate of the Eastman School of Music and has worked as a freelance musician in New York and Los Angeles, performing concerts and recording on many film and television soundtracks and albums. DAVID RESTIVO (violin) grew up in Houston, TX, and has played violin for almost 40 years. After receiving a BM from Texas State University, David moved to the Boston area, finally settling in Chappaqua with his family. In addition to working as a programmer, David was the Executive Director of Orchestra914 from 2013-2022, freelances for regional stage shows and performs with several orchestras in the NY area, including Orchestra 914 and Collegium of Westchester. His teachers include Stephen Redfield and Elliot Magaziner. David is excited to join the Westchester Chamber Soloists for a wonderful performance of Bach's – Brandenburg Concertos.

THOMAS SEFCOVIC (bassoon) is a long-standing member of the Orchestra of St. Luke's, performing on both bassoon and contrabassoon. He is also a member of the Mostly Mozart Festival Orchestra at Lincoln Center, New York Pops Orchestra, and has appeared with the New York Philharmonic, Metropolitan Opera, and Chamber Music Society of Lincoln Center. The conductors he has worked under include André Previn, Roger Norrington, Bernard Labadie, Kurt Masur, Zubin Mehta, Franz Bruggen, and Louis Langrée. On Broadway, he has performed in "Oklahoma!", "Swan Lake", Stephen Sondheim's "The Frogs", "A Little Night Music," and most recently the Tony Award winning Best Musical "A Gentleman's Guide to Love and Murder." Tom studied bassoon and contrabassoon with Lyell Lindsey of the Detroit Symphony, Hugh Cooper at the University of Michigan, Steven Maxym at the Manhattan School of Music, and had further studies with Arthur Weissberg.

He is also known as a specialist in early performance practice on period bassoon and contrabassoon and has performed and recorded with the Orchestra of the 18th Century in Amsterdam; the Handel and Haydn Society in Boston; Philharmonia Baroque in Berkeley, California; The Connecticut Early Music Festival; The Hanoverian Ensemble; and Tafelmusik in Toronto.
